FROM THE PRESIDENT'S DESK

I am happy to say that 2025 has been a year full of accomplishments and firsts for LVBHS. We obtained 501(c)(3) status as a nonprofit, which opens many options for donations and will help carry the Society into the future. Not only did LVBHS win first prize in the mini float category for the Flower Festival parade, but we also won first prize among eight states for the Pacific region garden clubs for our website! The LVBHS was featured in a newspaper article in the Santa Maria Sun in September. We began our first annual spring garden tour at the Burton Mesa

Chaparral Garden in May, and we hosted our first children's tour at the same garden in October. Finally, this November, the Society is topping off a year of achievements by hosting an event that has been dormant for 14 years: a plant sale!

The programs for 2025 were fun and engaging. Loretta Diaz presented on the Wonderful World of Herbs in January and Vito Vitelli presented on Central Coast Cacti in March. Our September program

had a guest speaker from Manzanita Nursery, Mackenzie Duncan. She gave an interactive and heartfelt presentation on her journey of reacquaintance with the world of plants - A Year in a Native Plant Nursery.

It is no secret that gardeners love to tour gardens: a group from the Society, organized by Martina Livingston, took a field trip to the Huntington Gardens in early June. It was a very full day, but everyone was happy and looking forward to the next visit. Closer to home, four private gardens were opened to Society members on a lovely day in mid-June. Hannelore Nixon noted that she had seen many gardens around the world, but the most special ones were often in someone's backyard.

The Society was sought out by the Vandenberg Village Community Services District (VVCSD) to advise on a demonstration garden in Vandenberg Village. A committee led by Martina Livingston mapped and planned a fantastic design that the VVCSD approved and will begin to implement in March 2026, wrapping up a successful collaboration. The City of Lompoc has also reached out to us for advice on their new Water Smart Landscaping Program. Members of the Society are creating a dataset that

allows utility conservation coordinators to expand the plants in their program and make it user friendly. Both projects help residents in obtaining rebates for transforming their grass yards to personal, low-water-use oases.

Peppered throughout the year, Society members also partook in Garden Care Days for both the Burton Mesa Chaparral Garden (BMCG) and the Drought Tolerant Garden (DTG). The volunteers did a fantastic job clearing the paths at the BMCG, which set us up for the successful Children's Garden Tour. On 'Make A Difference Day', our members and new friends spread mulch throughout the DTG, beautifying the garden and getting it ready for winter.

IN MEMORY OF MEMBER AL THOMPSON

LVBHS STAFF

As a youngster in his home state of Ohio, Albert "Al" Thompson, became intrigued with the plants and flowers he found along the rural paths and local gardens. Although trained as an artist, his fondness

for collecting and raising plants became a lasting passion. His teaching career brought him to Lompoc and, fortunately for LVBHS, he became a loyal and energetic member of our organization during its formative years. Over the past 45 years, Al contributed numerous horticultural articles to our newsletter and, occasionally, an original poem. He was also the one who built the first kiosk at the Chaparral Garden.

Al was a docent and garden historian at La Purisima Mission, where he encouraged the exploration of wildflowers and plants along the mission trails. He was also a docent at the Arroyo Hondo Preserve, where he led hiking tours and explained the importance of natural habitats.

At home, Al maintained a thriving garden, growing a great variety of flowers, as well as vegetables and fruit trees. He opened his garden for our summer members' garden tours on several

occasions. Al frequently brought lovely bouquets to our bimonthly meetings, as well as many plants to our garden club's annual plant and seed exchange. Of his many activities outside of our group, he was also a Rosarian (a certified expert on roses), contributing to published works and giving presentations at the Society's meetings on roses.

Over the past few years, Al's contributions to LVBHS slowly diminished, but not his enthusiasm and interest in plants. A past article written by him will sometimes appear in our newsletter when local input is missing. LVBHS has thrived for almost 50 years, buoyed along by the efforts such as those of Al Thompson.

BONSAI TREE THAT SURVIVED HIROSHIMA

Japanese Bonsai trees are often handed down from generation to generation, and such trees are prized possessions of families. One such tree was the Yamaki bonsai in Hiroshima, which had been in the Yamaki family for five generations.

The Yamaki Nursery was devastated by the atomic bomb. Yet the Yamaki bonsai remained intact among the wreckage. It is now deemed priceless, although it is valued at \$1 million.

Bonsai Master Masaru Yamaki gifted the tree to the USA in honor of the 1976 bicentennial. The nearly 400-year-old tree is now in the <u>US National Arboretum</u> in Washington, DC – a fitting home for such a glorious survivor.

MAKE YOUR OWN SIMMERING HOLIDAY POTPOURRI

[Adapted from the Farmers' Almanac for the Year 2025]



- 2 oranges, sliced
- 1 cup cranberries fresh or frozen
- 3 cinnamon sticks
- 1 teaspoon whole allspice berries
- 2 or 3 sprigs of fresh rosemary or pine needles
- 4 cups of water
 Simmer in a pot on the
 stovetop or in a slow
 cooker on low setting for
 4-6 hours. Check often
 adding water as needed.
 (Options: 1 or 2 whole star anise;
 1 tsp vanilla extract; apple juice
 in place of water)



#POLLINATORGARDEN

Now is the time to collect milkweed seeds: pods naturally split open in autumn - perfect for harvesting. Let them dry and store safely through winter. They will be ready for planting in the spring.
